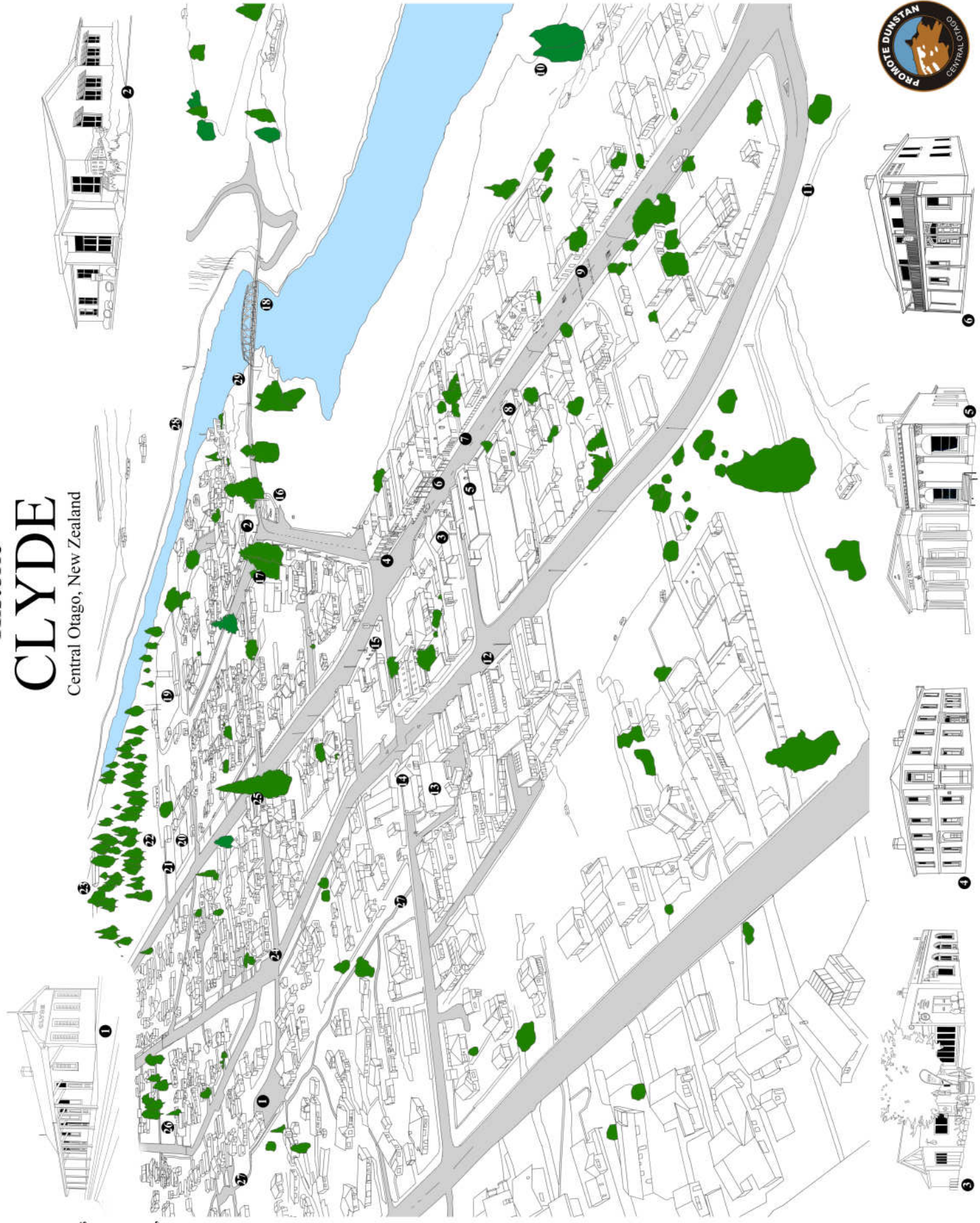


# Historic CLYDE

Central Otago, New Zealand



Clyde, a small town in Central Otago with a population of 1000, emerged during the New Zealand gold rush in the 1800s, but nowadays you'll find more fine wines than precious metals in this town. In fact, our event champions what Clyde is known for in the 21st century – having the world's most southerly vineyards, hidden within Central Otago's rich landscape and surrounded by its schist rock hills.

The town is surrounded by an area renowned first for gold then for its stone fruit orchards, especially in the Earnsclough district. The fruits thrived here in the hot, dry summers but more recently huge areas of grapes have been planted with local vineyards producing their internationally renowned Pinot Noir.

Many historic buildings have survived and the town centre has been declared an historic precinct. Some buildings have been refurbished as cafes, bars, and places to stay.
