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## **Dunstan Hospital Under Increasing Pressure.**

The demand for beds at Dunstan Hospital recently forced staff to divert some patients to Queenstown in what hospital General Manager Karyn Penno describes as a "very, very busy period".

The overcrowding has been caused by the acceleration in the region's population and a level of funding which now cannot cope with it.

"This means that at some point in the future we're going to need more in-patient capacity," Ms Penno says. "We're currently in conversation with the District Health Board on how to deal with the population growth which is happening much faster than anticipated."

The hospital is funded for 20 beds although several more, including high dependency beds and assessment unit short term stretchers, are available bringing the total to 31.

The hospital has until now managed to juggle the funding to cover the times when there are more than 20 patients by off-setting it against the times when the funded bed occupancy is under capacity. But, these days, the number of times it is under capacity is fewer and fewer, while the times when it is over is becoming more and more.

The hospital is coping, just, but things are likely to change soon when winter kicks in. Staff are currently planning a strategy to manage winter admissions.

#### **Clyde Lilliput Libraries**

The popularity of the little libraries in Clyde is spreading.

The Clyde and Districts Lions Club is now looking at installing six in Alexandra after receiving requests from residents there. The three Clyde libraries are attracting interest from many people who are taking and adding new books to the collections which can be found at Clyde School, 81 and 135 Hazlett St.

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## **New Heritage Panel for Lauder**





## The 10 Year Plan – Huge Response On Clyde Issues

A publicity campaign by the Central Otago District Council to generate feedback on its draft 10-Year Plan appears to have exceeded expectations with a record number of more than 450 submissions received.

The wastewater-sewage scheme and a proposal to upgrade the heritage precinct are two of the four key issues that directly involves Clyde and inspired about 340 people to submit on the former and 330 on the latter.

"It was a great shame that Clyde voted against a reticulated sewage system some years ago, but now it's time to bite that bullet," says Russell Garbutt, community board member for Clyde-Earnscleugh. "The three-stage plan seems logical and fair."

The sewage scheme is estimated to cost \$28.3 million, although inflation is likely to add about \$7.5 million. An upgrade of the heritage precinct comes in at \$830,000, although there could be changes to the options proposed by the Council.

"The plan for the heritage precinct has gone through some excellent consultation," says Mr Garbutt, "and the development of the carparking and extension of Miner's Lane is a good way of providing parking within walking distance from the already congested areas of Holloway and Sunderland Streets."

Two "drop-in" sessions in Clyde to discuss the projects presented in the 10 Year Plan attracted a big turnout from residents and cribbies eager to discuss the proposals.

Submissions on the plan have now closed and nearly 100 people throughout the region have indicated they want to speak in support of their submissions. Mr Garbutt says he is looking forward to seeing the result of this consultation process and "hopefully, support for these really big Clyde projects."

## **Unusual Fundraiser**

Lodge Dunstan has a novel fundraiser for the public to view over Queen's Birthday weekend in the lodge building in Clyde.

Twenty jigsaw puzzles containing a total of 80,000 pieces have been laid out on the floor of the lodge room to form a colourful display almost six metres long. The jigsaws were produced annually by Heye, a German company and Lodge Master Rory Butler has been doing them since 1993.

"Each jigsaw takes about six weeks to complete and the pieces are laid out on six large pieces of cardboard which can be

stacked and stowed if the dining room table is needed," he says. "I have a 12,000 piece one that I got in New York several years ago but it's still in its box until I get time."

The lodge rooms will be open to the public between 10am and 3pm on Saturday June 2 through to Monday. Admission is a gold coin.

The money raised will go towards St John first responder kits which are used by frontline teams in emergencies. Each kit costs about \$3000 and need regular replacement.
